They've got one more chance to shape up or they'll be kicked off the force. Undeterred, Curly sneaks out to visit, Maisy, his girlfriend. Maisy's pals also need dates but Moe and Larry are stuck at the station. Curly pulls a fire alarm to bring the Boys on the run, but they miss the truck and instead grab the Captain's brand new car. They get back to the station with Curly, but not without disastrous results.

THREE SAPPY PEOPLE (1939)



Director: Jules White. Writer: Clyde Bruckman. Cast: Moe, Larry & Curly, Richard Fiske, Lorna Gray (Adrian Booth), Don Beddoe, Bud Jamison. The Stooges are telephone repairmen who are mistaken for psychiatrists and are hired by wealthy Mr. Rumsford to treat his impulsive young wife. They are invited to her birthday dinner, which includes the never-miss combination of spiked punch, tamales, cream puffs (of course!) and a powder puff for good measure. Though the party ends in ruins, the Stooges actually manage to collect for "curing" Mrs. Rumsford. Chalk up one for the Boys! Featuring an interview with Adrian Booth!

CALLING ALL CURS (1939)



Director: Jules White. Writers: Elwood Ullman & Searle Kramer. Cast: Moe, Larry & Curly, Lynton Brent, Cy Schindell, Willa Pearl Curtis, Beatrice Blinn. The Stooges run a pet hospital and are taking care of a wealthy Mrs. Bedford's poodle, Carçon. Dognappers steal the poodle and the Boys first try disguising a mutt as the missing dog. When that doesn't work, they use the mutt as a bloodhound to track down the crooks. After a fight, the Boys manage to find Garçon who also has a surprise for them.

NO CENSUS, NO FEELING (1940)



Director: *Del Lord.* Writers: *Harry Edwards & Edward Ullman*

Cast: Moe, Larry & Curly, Vernon Dent, Symona Boniface,

Max Davidson, Bruce Bennett, Elinor Vandivere. The Stooges, once again dodging the cops, somehow get jobs as census takers and wind up in a fancy mansion. Moe and Larry join a bridge game while Curly masquerades as a cook, getting "puckered" results. On the lam again, the Boys, now disguised as football players, try to take the census at a stadium. Naturally, they wind up in the middle of the game.

SPOOKS (1953) In 3-D!

Director: Jules White. Cast: Moe, Larry & Shemp, Phil Van Zandt, Tom Kennedy, Norma Randall. The Stooges are private detectives hired to find missing Bea Bopper. Disguised as pie salesmen, they end up wandering around a mad scientist's mansion. The Boys confront a gorilla and various other bad guys who aim cleavers, pitchforks, even hypodermic needles right at them before they throw a few punches of their own and rescue Ms. Bopper.(One of two Stooge shorts originally filmed in 3-D.)
